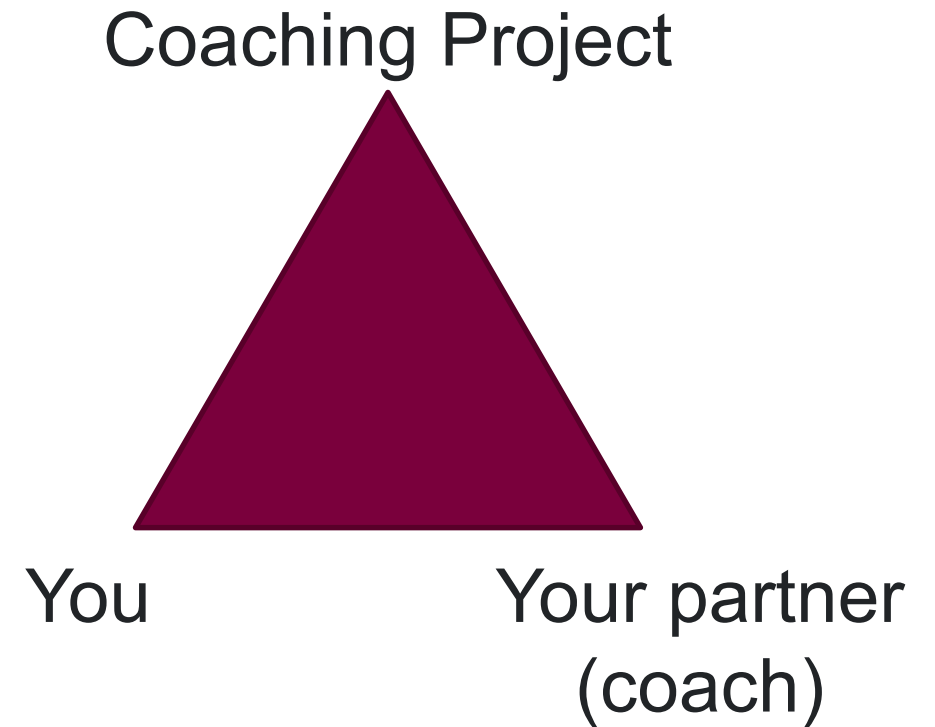

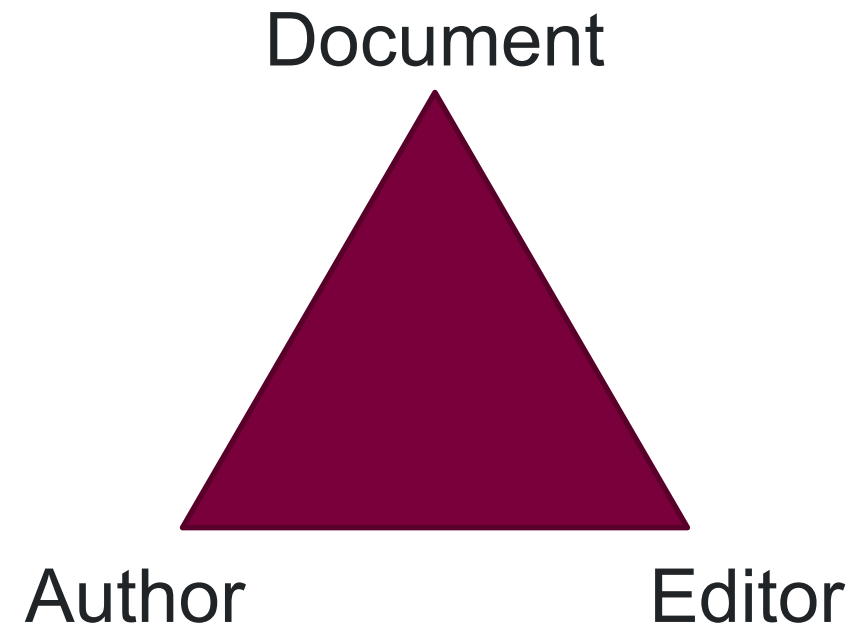
# Editing is Coaching

A coach supports a learner or client (or colleague) in achieving a specific personal or professional goal by providing training and guidance



# Editing is Coaching

An editor supports an author in achieving a specific goal by providing training and guidance

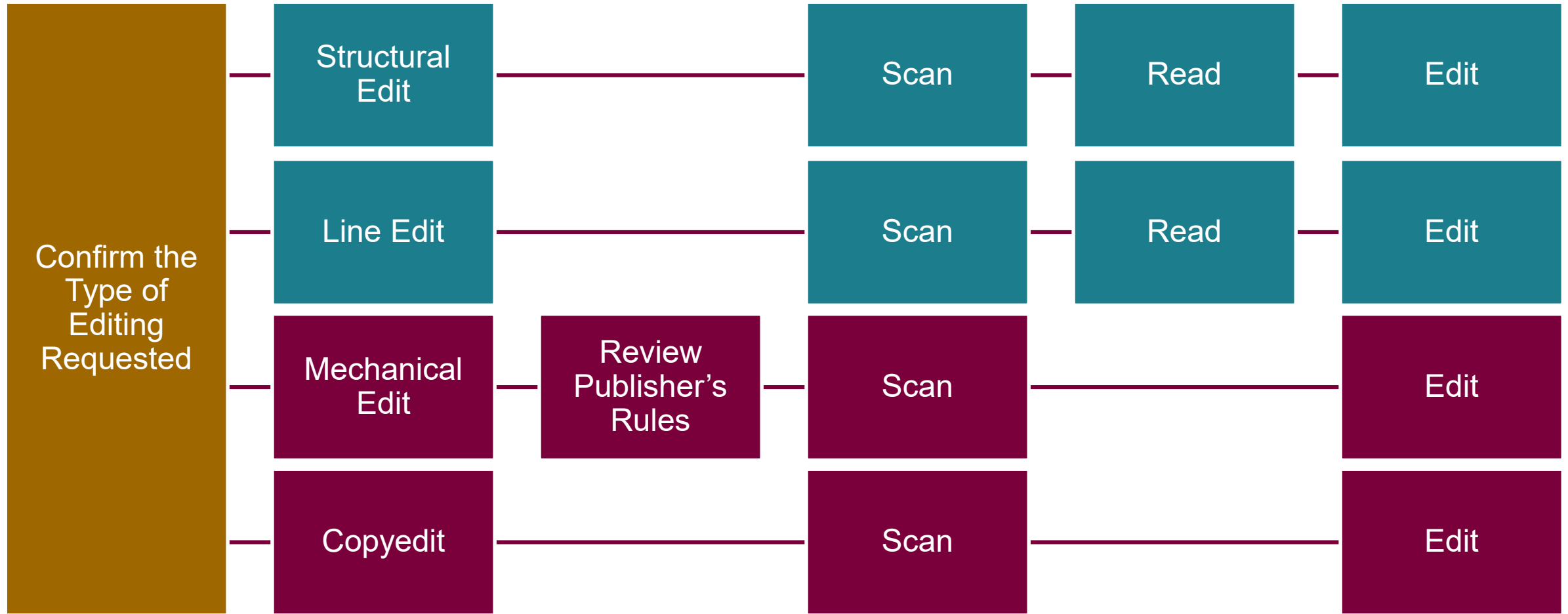


# Four Types of Editing

- Structural Editing (Substantive Editing)
  - Structure, organization and presentation of writing across sentences, paragraphs, sub-sections and the whole piece
- Line Editing (Stylistic Editing)
  - Looking at the writing line-by-line, considering word choice, sentence structure — generally, tightening individual lines
- Mechanical Editing
  - Applying defined style rules  
e.g., the specific spellings or citation style used by the publisher
- Copyediting
  - Fixing spelling, grammar and punctuation mistakes.

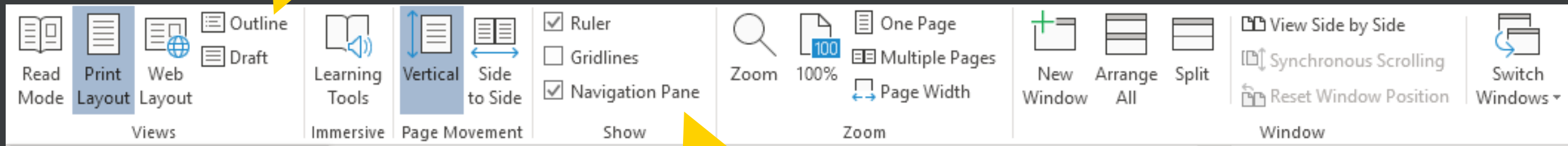


# Getting to the Editing



# Scanning

1. Use **previewing functions** of word processor to see heading and section structure



2. Scan the middle

3. Read the end

# Reading

- Don't start to edit yet
  - **Read like a reader** not like an editor, these are different
- Make a note of the points that cause you issues as a reader
  - If line editing, look for these at the sentence level
  - If structural editing, look at the paragraph, segment or section and higher levels

# Structural Editing: The Shape of the Building

## Pyramid

- Full story builds over time
- Most important point comes at the end
- Each paragraph builds on the preceding paragraphs

- Reader could really stop at any point
- Most important point comes at the front
- Each paragraph builds on the preceding paragraphs

# Structural Editing: Looking at the Doors

- Opening
  - Does it draw in the reader?
  - Does it properly set the tone of the document?
  - Does it introduce the topic?
- Conclusion
  - Does it *complete* the writing?
    - Ending must fit the genre and objective: should it be a summary, a call to action, the next steps for research, etc.

- Give yourself space between editing and more editing
- Remember that **you're not the reader**

# RC's Perspective on Managing Feedback

- Always go back to the data
- Talk to a “specialist”
- You’ll eventually have to just make a decision
- To feedback that still seems to be incorrect, respond and explain
